

Sigrid Kvisle has been honored by being awarded the cultural prize from the main committee for growth and culture in Sigdal. This prize is awarded every 2 years to someone who is a major cultural contributor in the community. Sigrid is on the main committee who chooses the prizewinner each year so was quite surprised when she realized she was one of the finalists. She removed herself to the hallway during the decision-making process. Having suggested the previous award winners, she now feels that she is in very good company.

Sigrid is currently leading the editorial board in Under Norefjell. She is both the secretary and treasurer of the Sigdal Museum Friends and has helped with the editing of the village books. She has also been active in the

Skredsvig Gallery and has positions with Lauvila's friends and in Bygdekvinnelaget. An accomplishment she is most proud of however is facilitating the installation of the Madonna statue in Trillemarka.

The cultural award is a replica of the sculpture originally made by Nils Aas that was raised in Eggedal in 2004. This sculpture was inspired by the Christian Skredsvig painting, Idyll, which he painted in Eggedal in 1888. Sigdal kommune is allowed to have replicas made by Christine Reintz, exclusively for the cultural award. The sculpture was awarded to Sigrid on Bygdedagen at Sigdal Museum August 12th, 2018. Bygdedagen is a day of celebration that includes arts and crafts, foods, a flea market, a classic car and tractor show and various of

flea market, a classic car and tractor show and various cultural events. Sigrid is very excited to place the sculpture above her fireplace.



Article from 1947 regarding the Sigdalslag Stevne in Roseau, Minnesota

discovered by Historian, Sheila Winstead in the Roseau Times-Region Archives

1947 To Roseau's inhabitants and the Sigdalslag First, I must say many thanks for our very pleasant stevne in Roseau 15-17 June. Thanks to the Norwegian mayor and the town's inhabitants for their friendliness and help. To all who took part in the program and not to forget Rev. Ronholm for his very educational speech and pretty song. To those who came a long way from Iowa and Wisconsin and the Norwegian newspapers who have done so much for all the bygdelags. We all ought to support them.

We have an excellent management who do all they can so the lag can continue. And I will say to those who believe that our lag will die out soon, that I think that our next stevne will be better than any other we have had. We must all begin at once to work for our next stevne and also not to be too stingy with money when it is a matter of putting together a good program. We hope that everyone will meet up again next year, and also a lot more who didn't take part this year. It is healthy to come to these stevnes and meet many pleasant and good people. One becomes like young again. It is a failing with many of us, that when one is busy one becomes tense and fretful. The wife was certainly right. I ought to dig myself out and be on the way to the Sigdalslag. So it happened that my good friend, Knut, who has an outstanding restaurant in Mayville, and I started out. He had also gotten the same advice from his better half, that it would do him a lot of good to go out on a trip. Oh my, for the good time we had. Now we can live on good memories for a long time.

When we came home our wives almost didn't know us, because of the smiling and sunshine over everything. Everything was very good. The restaurant had done brilliant business, and when I came home the store was full of customers and the dealings went on. And because of that we certainly can go next year, too.

So to conclude, I will remind all Sigdølers, Eggedølers and Kryllings that they must hurry and send in their biographies for the Sigdal book, which I will try to get ready for the next meeting. Dear countrymen, help me so we can put together a big and good book. I got a lot of orders for the book at the meeting and also some from Norway.

Another letter, likely from later in 1947:

To the Sigdalslag and other lags

There are people who think that our bygdelag will die out quite soon, because the older members die away and it doesn't look like the younger ones seem to have much interest in this lag. I think that is a faulty conception. It is up to us to put together entertainment that will be suitable for both the older and younger, and that is easily done. The lag will not die out if we go at it in the right manner, but it takes time and work. So it is necessary to have good officers who will work for the good of the lag.

At our last annual meeting in Roseau, Minnesota, we had a very good program in Norwegian and in the evening it was mostly in English. Several plays were put on by youth from Roseau and nearby towns. Very well done. I heard several say that it was the best that they had heard and seen. We can put together much good if we combine efforts. Then there is no danger that the bygdelags will fall away. We have many good talents among us. We had with us one of the best violin players, Dr.





Kvisling's wife. It was a delight to hear her play and sing about Ola. But best was the woman from Eagle Grove, Mari Sexe. She is a very outstanding writer and singer. It is not dull when she is present. The bygdelags will win much by getting Mari along at their lag stevnes. We can be happy to have her with us at our next lag. Then you can be convinced that it will be worthwhile to come, even if it is a long way. I am sending hereby a poem by Mari Sexe, "The Sigdal we left:. Eggedal and Krødsherad are also included in that pretty poem. (It still is too bad that she is not an Eggedøling.) I think that Elbow Lake will be a good place for our lag next year. According to what our secretary, Mr. Jacobson, says, we have gotten an invitation from there. Good people remember our meeting. You will find out that it is worth the little time and expense to come to these lags. One becomes like young again and can live long on light memories. Often one becomes weepy and contrary when one has it so busy at home all the time. Then it is about what to do to come out and meet so many nice people. There will be good plays and many other strange things.

"Fanten og Kjaeringen" have promised to be there along with several who have just come from Norway. To conclude, I will again ask you to send in your biographies or other old things of interest for the Sigdalsbook.

A. S. Aasand, Manfred, North Dakota, was born on the Aasand farm in Eggedal, the son of Stener Stenersen and Anna Pedersdatter, nee Frovold. He was confirmed by the well known minister Anders Hovden. He worked as a merchant there for a few years until he emigrated to America in 1908. He then took a homestead and bought some land besides. He farmed for two years. Then he began

as a salesman in his brother's hardware and furniture business. When his brother wanted to take a trip to Norway, he bought the business. Since then he has bought a general merchandise store. He now runs two stores in the same town. In 1919 he married Emma Alotte Opsahl, born at Northwood, North Dakota.

Replica of the Oseberg Wagon to be built by Sigdalslag member Don Rorvig and Roger Hanson of Stoughton, WI

The original wagon was made between 800-820 AD and used until it was buried with the Oseberg Viking Ship. A replica has been made by Bjarte Aarseth, conservator of the Viking Ship Museum in Oslo Norway where it is currently stored. Don and Roger have plans to create one for use in America. The project will take approximately 2-3 years, much of it intricately detailed carving. They are looking for people or groups to invest in this project as the cost of the wagon itself is estimated to be around \$10,000. Other miscellaneous costs such as shop space, heating, trailer, etc... will bring the costs to the \$20-25,000 range. Its portablilty upon completion will make it a great addition for many Norwegian themed events such as parades, reunions and stevner, with those who have contributed to the fund having first consideration in its use. The original Oseberg Wagon is 1200 years old so with proper maintenance your donation could be very long lasting! He attended the Glesne School for the elementary grades and graduated from Elkader High School with the class of 1945. He attended the University of Iowa for one semester. John enlisted in the U.S. Navy January 1946 and was discharged December 1947. While in the U.S. Navy and stationed on Saipan, John played baseball. He completed his college studies at Luther College graduating in 1951. At Luther, John was a catcher on the baseball team

On July 14, 1950, John was united in marriage to Ann Stokke at Glenwood Lutheran Church. They eloped! John was a Social Studies/History teacher and coach in Glenwood, Minnesota for two years, where he also played Summer League Baseball. For ten years he was a teacher/coach in Harmony, Minnesota. Ambrose passed away at CHI-St. Francis Health Hospital in Breckenridge, MN on Tuesday, May 15, 2018 at age 99 years and 9 months. The visitation will be held from 5:00 p.m. to 7:00



p.m. on Monday, May 21, 2018 at First Lutheran Church in Britton, SD with a prayer service at 6:00 p.m. The visitation will resume at 12:00 p.m. on Tuesday, May 22, 2018 at First Lutheran Church of Britton, SD and will be followed immediately by the funeral service at 1:00 p.m. with Rev. Terrill Sorensen officiating. The interment will be in the

Trondhjem Cemetery in rural Veblen. Funeral arrangements have been entrusted to Joseph Vertin and Sons Funeral Home in Breckenridge. Ambrose Charles Gronseth was born on the family

farm in rural Pleasant Valley on August 12, 1918, in the original farmhouse, to Ole A. and Elsie (Syverson) Gronseth. In October 1918, the family moved into the newly built farm home which remains in the family today. Ambrose lived on the same farm for 92 years until the year 2010.

He attended grade school at Pleasant Valley #3 and graduated from Britton High School in the class of 1936. During his adolescence, he assisted his father on the farm raising livestock and crops. In the fall of 1936, he enrolled in the Minneapolis College of Business for the class year. He then returned to Britton and began farming with his father Ole and his grandfather Andrew G. Gronseth. In his younger years he enjoyed bowling, pheasant hunting and traveling around the United States. In 1951, he met the love of his life, Eleanore Severson. Many social trips were taken to Watertown, where Eleanore was a special needs teacher with the Watertown Public School System. They were married in June of 1952 - the first wedding in the "new" First Lutheran Church building. After a twoweek honeymoon to Yellowstone and Salt Lake City they returned to the farm to begin a new life together.

Farming allowed him to continue providing for his growing family while he pursued his interest in business and management, much like his great-grandfather. In the late 1960s, for health reasons, he retired from farming and became an insurance agent for South Dakota AAA based out of Sioux Falls. He represented Day, Marshall and Roberts Counties for approximately 15 years making many new friends and acquaintances and establishing a successful insurance portfolio and travel/auto policies. During this time and in succeeding years, he and Eleanore continued to live on the farm, maintaining and improving the buildings, trees, and land. They also raised large gardens each year and would often share the fruits of their labors with family and friends. As a couple, Ambrose and Eleanore were very involved in community and social events including the Marshall County Historical Society, Senior Citizens, Sons of





Norway, First Lutheran Church, as well as playing cards with many local friends. They also found time to be very involved with their four sons' lives and as a result became an integral and cherished part of their eight grandchildren's lives. Many road trips were made to Michigan, Minnesota and Mitchell, SD for babysitting and church/school events. Ambrose was an excellent role model for his four sons teaching them early in life the importance of optimism, faith, hard work, respect for the land, sharing of your time and talents, and gratitude to family and friends.

Following the death of his wife, Eleanore in 2010, Ambrose chose to leave the farm and go live with his son, Tim, in Northfield, MN. Following Tim's retirement in 2015, Ambrose relocated to Twin Town Villa in Breckenridge, Minnesota to be closer to his son, Mark. In May 2017, Ambrose moved to the long-term care facility at the Breckenridge Hospital. At each of his new homes, Ambrose made new friends quickly and enjoyed playing cards and other social activities.

Ambrose is survived by his four sons and families - Mark and Colleen of Breckenridge, MN; Timothy of Britton and Young America, MN; Dwight and Michele of Oronoco, MN; and Wayne and Barb of Mitchell, SD. Grandchildren Alex(Jessica); Aaron (Sarah); Kevin(fiancé Jennifer); Brandon(Danielle); Collin (Whitney); Nicholas(Jessica); Nathaniel(Allison) & Sara Carrico. Carolyn Nelson 1945-2018

Carolyn M. Nelson, 72, of Rochester, MN, died June 3, 2018, at Seasons Hospice House following a courageous battle with pancreatic cancer. She was born in Fergus Falls, Minnesota, on December 23,



1945 to Roy and Mildred (Helleckson) Evavold. She grew up on her parents' farm south of Fergus Falls, attended country school District #64 through the eighth grade and graduated from Fergus Falls High School in 1963. Carolyn went on to attend Bethesda Lutheran Hospital School of Radiologic Technology in St. Paul, graduating in June 1965. On September 10, 1966, she was united in marriage to Ronald Nelson at Rock Prairie Lutheran Church in rural Elbow Lake, Minnesota. They lived in St. Cloud and also the Twin Cities until 1975, when they began farming near Elbow Lake. Carolyn worked part-time as a radiologic technologist and medical transcriptionist at the hospital in Elbow Lake for 19 years while assisting her husband with the farming operation. She later worked at Prairie Medical in Morris and at Lake Region Hospital in Fergus Falls. In 2003, they moved to Rochester, where Carolyn was employed by Mayo Medical Center as a medical transcriptionist until retiring in 2015.

During the time they lived in the Elbow Lake area,




Formation of Agder Lag
